

APA Style Referencing: Guide and Examples

References cited in the text of a research paper or thesis must appear in a Reference List or bibliography. The APA citation style is a generic **author-date** style which was established by the American Psychological Association for documenting sources used in a research paper or thesis. APA style was developed by social and behavioural scientists to standardise scientific writing which requires both Intext citations and a Reference List.

This guide is based on the 6th edition of the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (APA), but is not comprehensive guide. This brochure contains examples of references in APA style. The most common kinds of references are illustrated here. Online guidelines for commonly asked questions, complex expression of writing and tips on specific question are available from http://apastyle.apa.org

Basic In-Text Citation Style

As the name author–date system implies, APA Style in-text citations include the author and date, either both inside parentheses, or, with the author names in running text and the date in parentheses. Here are two examples:

- After the intervention, children increased in the number of books read per week (Smith & Wexwood, 2010).
- Smith and Wexwood (2010) reported that after the intervention, children increased in the number of books read per week.

The "and" in Smith and Wexwood is written as an ampersand (&) inside parentheses and as the word and outside of parentheses, as shown in the examples above.

Multiple In-Text Citations

When multiple studies support what you have to say, you can include multiple citations inside the same set of parentheses. Within parentheses, alphabetize the studies as they would appear in the reference list and separate them by semicolons. In running text, you can address studies in whatever order you wish.

Here are two examples:

- Studies of reading in childhood have produced mixed results (Albright, Wayne, & Fortinbras, 2004; Gibson, 2011; Smith & Wexwood, 2010).
- Smith and Wexwood (2010) reported an increase in the number of books read, whereas Gibson (2011) reported a decrease. Albright, Wayne, and Fortinbras (2004) found no significant results.

- All in-text citations direct the reader to the appropriate source in the reference list at the end of the text
- Author's last name and source publication year typically included in an in-text citation
- For direct quotations and some paraphrases, give a page number as well: (Smith, 2006, p. 9)

Writing Style for Reference List: Some General Rules

- Arrange the items on your reference list alphabetically
- Indent the second and following lines six (6) spaces or half inch
- Write the surname (family name or last name) first, then follow by the initials of the authors' first (and middle) names
- If no author is given, start with the title and the date

In-Text Citation (Paraphrase) - entry that appears in the body of your paper when you express the ideas of a researcher or author using your own words.

In-Text Citation (Quotation) - entry that appears in the body of your paper after a direct quote.

List the source by title in your reference list. Alphabetise reference list entries beginning with a title using the primary word of the title (excluding a, an, and the).

For periodical, book, brochure or report with no author, cite in the text the first few words of the reference list entry (usually the title of the article or book) and the year.

Use double quotation marks around the Title of an article, a chapter, or a webpage and italicise the title of a periodical or a book.

If the item is produced by an organisation, treat the organisation as a "corporate author". This can include government departments, universities, associations, societies, companies, etc.

Where the author and publisher are identical, use the word Author as the name of the publisher.

If group author is readily identified by its abbreviation, you may abbreviate the name in the second and subsequent citations.

Authors with the Same Surname

To avoid confusion, use initials with the last names if your reference list includes two or more authors with the same last names.

Research by J. Young (1989) revealed that ...

Survey by E. Young (1990) proved that ...



When you are citing a subscription database do NOT include the full long URL.

Rule: Subscription Database

Don't: Since a subscription database item is only available if the reader has access, you should not include the long URL of the item.

Do: Do include the homepage URL of the database to show the reader the name of the publisher and how one would be able to access the item if they obtained a subscription to the database.



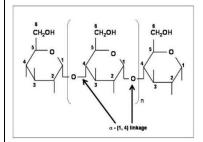


Figure 2.2: Section of the amylose molecule showing the repeating anhydroglucose unit (adapted and modified from Madihah, 2001).



PERSONAL COMMUNICATION

Personal Communications include private letters, memos, emails from unarchived sources, personal interviews, telephone conversations, and similar resources. As these sources do not provide recoverable data.

Personal Communications are not included in the Reference List (You **do not** need to include an entry in the reference list). Cite Personal Communications in-text only. Details can be provided in running text or in parentheses.

In your in-text citation of a Personal Communication give the initials as well as the surname of the communicator, and provide as exact a date as possible. Note that the initials precede the family name in the parenthetical citation.

Use your judgment in citing other electronic forms, like Twitter or SMS Texts, as Personal Communications. Remember that what you cite should have scholarly relevance.

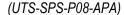
